Last truck leaves Emu Plains Quarry

It was the end of an era recently as the last load of raw feed was hauled out of the extraction area at the Emu Plains Quarry in western Sydney - a huge moment in the history of aggregate supply into the Sydney area.

This means the primary source of aggregates now moves from Emu Plains down to Marulan. Many Boral plants and customers have already transferred over to Peppertree Quarry products and over the coming weeks the final stages of our integration plan will be completed.

The last 18 months has been spent getting Peppertree ready for this day. Our team has worked hard and we now have an operation that is running consistently and efficiently. The future is exciting and we believe we have the operation and the team ready to meet the challenge.
